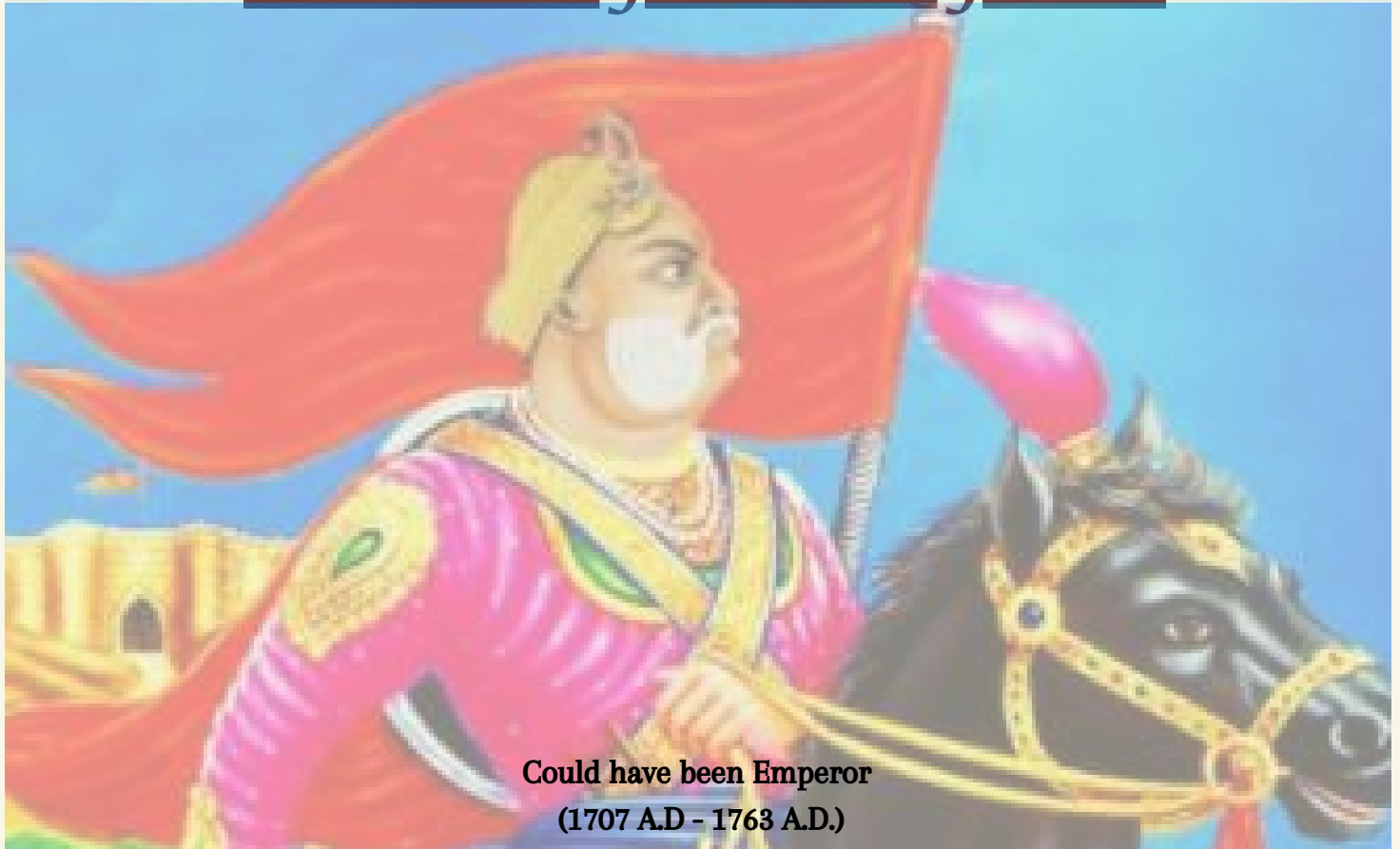

MAHARAJA SURAJMAL



**Could have been Emperor
(1707 A.D - 1763 A.D.)**

The political landscape of India during the eighteenth century was not much different from what it had tended to be, more or less the same as far as its divisiveness is concerned, except of course, the period of the great empires of the Mauryas, the Guptas and the great Mughals . The British Empire comes into its own category.

The decline of the Mughal Empire, after Aurangzeb, was primarily caused by his thoughtless bigotry and reckless economic policies. In contrast to this the established tolerant approach of the Great Mughals had been responsible for maintaining amity and stability in the empire. North and Northwestern India during the later part of the seventeenth century was in continuous turmoil. The peasant revolt led by Gokula in 1680, though unsuccessful on the surface, proved a catalectic in igniting the minds of the peaceful village folk to fight for their rights. The eighteenth century brought bad omens for the Mughal Empire.

The impending vacuum in power led to the inviting of new players like the Jats, the Marathas and the several aspiring Muslim noblemen in the arena of politics, vying to occupy the space. The same year (1707) gave to the peasantry of North India a son, like the sun risen on the horizon in the birth of Surajmal in the house of a peasant chief Raja Badan Singh of Bhagalpur. Surajmal as a young boy joined his father as the latter's right hand man and helped in consolidating and expanding the Bharatpur territory to be ultimately recognized as a kingdom of consequence by the Mughal Emperor.

With the deterioration of the sight of Badan Singh, Surajmal assumed the reins of the Bharatpur kingdom as a defacto ruler. Moving on from where his father had reached, he acquired new territories for the Bharatpur State. But the hallmark of his approach to restrict his endeavors in spreading his influence only over the territories largely dominated by his compatriots, the Jat peasants, who thought of republican propensities, accepted and timed went with the monarchical ruler. On his part Surajmal kept a peasant's profile both in manners and conduct. He had acquired the reputation of a warrior of great prowess at a fairly young age. His performance in the battle of succession at Baghru (1748) fighting from the side of Ishwar Singh of Jaipur lives on as a legend even today. Surajmal had risen to the occasion to fulfill his word given to the dying Raja Jai Singh. The powerful Marathas fighting on the side of the other contender Madho Singh had to taste dust in the rather fateful encounter. But at the time Surajmal was well aware of the devastation that war brings to the common people. Therefore as far as possible he ensured that his territories do not turn into an arena of war. Internally he maintained law and order thoroughly ensuring safety of the life and wealth of not only his subjects but also the safe return of the wealth of traders which they preferred to deposit with Surajmal in times of turbulence. He continued to be helpful to the rising rulers of the peasant fraternity like Balram of Ballabgarh, Rana Bhim Singh of Gohad and the Jat rulers of Bajhod, Kajaura and Karauli.

How he handled, without
giving up, the seize of his fort at
Kumher (1754) laid by a confederacy of the Marathas, the
Mughal Wazir Imad and Rohilla chief Najib can be described as
an incredible feat. He did not hesitate to part with his hard earned
wealth to be given as war expenses to mighty opponents, be they the
money seeking Marathas or the avaricious Afghan Abdali.

Surajmal's best talent came out in the moments of crisis and turbulence. He kept his cool and baffled his contemporaries with his adroit diplomatic moves on many occasions precariously placed as he was between

Abdali and on the North and the Marathas on the South, and had to continuously deal with the established Rajputs. With his robust communication skills he succeeded in evading an invasion by Abdali (1757) who was lurking in the vicinity of Bharatpur after having devastated major parts of the Brij country side. The contents and tone and tenor of his letter to Abdali given below is seen by experts as an example of fine diplomacy:

I have no important position and power in the empire of Hindustan. I am one of the zamindars living in the desert and on account of my worthlessness none of the Emperors of the age thought it worthy of him to interfere with my affairs. Now that a powerful Emperor like your Majesty, determined on meeting and opposing me face to face in the field of battle, would draw his armies against this insignificant person, that action alone would be discreditable to the dignity and greatness of the Shah and would help in the elevation of my position and people would say that the Emperor of Iran and Turan had, out of extreme fear, marched his armies upon a penniless nomad. These words alone would be a matter of great shame for your Majesty... Moreover, the ultimate result is not altogether free from uncertainty. If with all this power and equipage, you succeed in destroying a weakling like me, what credit there will be gained?...

But if by divine decree, which is not known to anyone, the affair takes a different turn (i.e. Ahmed Shah is forced to embrace defeat) all this power and predominance brought about by your Majesty during a period of eleven years will finish in a moment. As to the threatening and violent order issued for the slaughter and devastation of myself, warriors have no fear on that score. It is well known that no intelligent man has any faith in this transient life. As for myself, have already crossed fifty of the stages (of life) and know nothing of the remaining.

There shall be no greater blessing than that I should drink the drought (of martyrdom)...in the field of battle with valiant soldiers and leave my name and that of my ancestors on the pages of the book of the age to be remembered that a powerless peasant breathed equality with such a great and powerful emperor as had reduced mighty king to subjection and that he fell fighting. And the same virtuous intention lies at heart of my faithful followers and companions. Even if I wish to make up my mind to attend the threshold of your... Court the honor of my friends does not permit me. Under such circumstances, if your majesty.... forgive me and turn your attentions to expeditions of greater importance, no harm shall come to your dignity and glory. The truth about the three forts (belonging to me), the object of your wrath which have been regarded by your Majesty's chiefs as weak as spider's web, shall be tested only after an actual contest. God willing they shall be invincible as Alexander's Rampart.

[Quoted from Tarikh-i-Imad-ul-Mulk, 243-245 by Ganda Singh, Durrani, 181-183]

You have not conquered India as yet. If you have taken hold of an inexperienced child (Imad) who held Delhi, what is there to be proud of? If you have any pretensions, why this delay (in attacking me)?... I have spent large sums of money on this (Kumher) fort. The Shah can be kind to me by fighting with me as that the world may remember in future that a Badshah came from Vilayat and conquered Delhi, but was helpless against an insignificant zamindar. [Jam-i-Jahan Numa quoted by Ganda Singh, Durrani, p.183].

It is a
matter of regret that
but for the Marathas his
efforts to form a coalition against
Abdali bore little fruit In not listening to his Saner
counsel the Maratha general Bhau had to pay a heavy price in
the battle against Abdal i at Panipat (1761). Surajmal indeed did not
join the Marathas at Panipat because he had seen through their game.
He had been forewarned by some well-meaning elements around Bhau about his plan to swallow
the Jat principality along with the Delhi throne once he was done up with Abdali. Surajmal was not a
nitwit not to have seen through the Maratha's game.

Surajmal had all the qualities of a good ruler. Welfare of his subjects was his main concern. Trade and commerce thrived in his kingdom as he remitted transit duties and facilitated commercial transactions. He did not spend his money in wasteful projects but he did not lag behind in creating a fully-fledged department of charity under Somnath Chaturvedi. He patronized men of Art and Learning. The forts and buildings raised by him at Deeg, Bharatpur, Kumher and Wair are standing testimony of his taste as a builder and connoisseur of Art. His adopting of a happy blend of the features of Mughal and Hindu architecture in his buildings produced a new style called the Jat architecture. About his palace at Deeg which got completed several years after his death, Father Wendell, a contemporary has to say:

"It is difficult to realize the expanse and magnificence of this palace without seeing it. I have seen none in Hindustan that would surpass it in magnificence or would come near to it."

Surajmal was liberal in his religious views. He built several tanks, arbors, temples and chhatris at Govardhan, Mathura and Vrindavan and other places. He was equally regardful of Islam. When tauntingly asked by Malharrao, how the Jama Masjid at Mathura was proudly standing in his Hindu principality, he simply remarked that he could demolish it if someone could guarantee that no single temple will be dismantled as a consequence or more importantly if anyone could guarantee him perpetual royalty, a fickle commodity. His friendship with Safdarjung was based on mutual faith and trust which stood all ordeal. Equally intense was his disliking and hatred for Najib. In the words of Wendell, "He was loved by his own and respected by all near him not so much because of the exploits which he accomplished, as because he was forthright in his capability to do what he had taken upon himself."

The military legacy of Surajmal speaks of his organizing skills and vision of planning internal and external security for the people of his state. He left behind a cavalry of 15000 strength, 25000 infantrymen, 300 pieces of cannons with 60 elephants and 50 horses in stables apart from a well-endowed treasure.

Had Surajmal not been stubbornly determined in not heeding to Najeeb's repeated pleadings for reconciliation on the issue of the Mewari nawab's betrayal, occasion would not have occurred forward the son of Mewati to have been lurking around for revenge. His going back on his word given to the Nawab of Farrukh Nagar was not in line with his entire polity and temperament demonstrated throughout his career. We can only guess. Perhaps Surajmal had better reasons for behaving as did.

Had Surajmal survived the ambush attack on him made on him (on 25 December 1763) with a stratagem in east of Delhi at a time when victory was merely at a smelling distance, the political map of India would have been differently drawn and its history differently shaped. In other words Surajmal would have been sitting in the throne of Delhi which he so richly deserved. But who can write the script of destiny already written?

Department of Business Administration

Management is "Art of organization, coordination, planning, controlling, direction and most importantly innovation"; "The management is the way to reach on the top of the height as soon as possible by using your leadership and working proficiency."

Bachelor of Business Administration is much sought after professional courses these days. It is an established fact that the Student of Commerce stream after passing 12th class prefer BBA course as their first choice. BBA is a three year degree program. This degree aims at providing fundamental education in business and management principles. BBA program offers practical management training that can prepare students to successfully work within any type of organization. This is a job oriented course. This college is known for its 100% Placement in this discipline. In this regard BBA course of MSI has achieved 4th position in India as per Times of India Survey 2018. According to India Today's 2019 Survey, MSI is ranked No. 1 in Delhi. Some students of this stream have been selected in civil services in the last years. This shows the credibility and prospects of this course apart from the reputation of MSI in GGSIPU.

During this course emphasis on creativity, critical thinking and think out of the box is given by the faculty for the betterment of the students. Experts from the field of business administration and management are invited to deliver lecture to mould the attitude and aptitude required for professional growth of the students. It includes complete knowledge of leadership and management. In MSI Students get practical experience, read assigned materials, attend seminars, and prepare an internship report. Students are encouraged to attend leadership training workshops and conferences; including, but not limited to, public speaking, group dynamics, and problem solving, and evaluating techniques. The degree programme in Business administration is one of the most jobs provider educational degree course. In India and abroad, there are various multinational industries, which are offering jobs to various business graduates. The best part of programme is that the student having any subject in its 12th standard can get admission in the BBA programme. In MSI various companies like JUV Technology, Mahindra Comviva, Reliance Ind. Ltd (Reliance Trends), Shyam Spectra, Edutrainer, Usha International, Reliance Jio visit for campus placement. A MSI BBA graduate can earn on average in between 3.54 Lakh per annum to 8.40 lakh per annum.

BBA degree allows the candidates to enter in the field of management. This degree teaches the students with various aspects that are necessary for effective business management and essential for entrepreneurs and business managers. Bachelor in Business Administration also gives you a platform for pursuing courses like MBA. To do well in this field, students must possess leadership qualities, decisional making skills, and good oral and written communication skills. In India, the accreditation body for BBA is AICTE (All India Council of Technical Education). There are different accreditation bodies in different countries.

If you are not satisfied with the career or course you chose for yourself then there are many short-term yet high values – low investment courses available in the market. There are wide host of career options available to you that you can pick and choose from, based on your aptitude and interests. Choose what suits you the best!

FURTHER STUDIES :

a) Company Secretary (CS)

This course is certified by Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI). Companies Secretary is 10+2 examination from a recognized University and the candidate must secure at least 55% aggregate marks in their examination. Candidates who are pursuing or waiting for the final year of 12th examination may also eligible to apply for CS examination. The candidate age should have a minimum 17 years at the time of appearing for Foundation course. Company Secretary Course divided into three stages:-

- Foundation course.
- Intermediate Course or Executive course.
- Final Course or professional course.

Candidates who have completed 12th examination with 55% aggregate mark are eligible to apply for Foundation course. After completing foundation course, the candidates need to clear second level of course. Those who clear all the level of the Company Secretary course is granted Membership to the Institute.

b) Certified Management Accountant (CMA)

If you have plans of going global or working in the Top MNCs then going for international certifications is the right choice for you. The CMA is offered by the Institute of Management Accountants (IMA) USA and the content is regularly reviewed by the Institute of Certified Management Accountants (ICMA).

To become a CMA, a student is required to clear two examinations. CMA demonstrates your professional expertise in financial planning, analysis, control, decision support, and the potential employers.

c) CRISIL Certified Analyst Program

Not much known to all, this course is offered by CRISIL with Narsee Monjee Institute of Management Studies (NMIMS) as its academic partner. It provides you with live projects on various research and analysis subjects with more liberal syllabus than other master courses.

d) Masters of Commerce (M.Com)

The very first option is masters in your own subjects. It is very common of students going for the Master's degree in Commerce after completing B.Com. It is a two year program and you can pursue it from any of the recognized institutes. M.Com is a program that focuses on systematic study of Accounting, Business, Finance, Economics, Statistics, Taxation, Marketing and Management and therefore it gives insights about all the fields. Also, students interested in research can opt for M.com followed by M.Phil. and Ph.D. This set of qualification offers you with teaching jobs at university level.

e) Chartered Accountant (CA)

After clearing one of the groups, a student is required to register for article ship with experienced CA's for a period of two and a half years. After clearing both groups of IPCC and successfully completing your article ship you can appear for Final CA. Final CA again has two groups and after clearing both the groups, you can proudly affix the words CA before your name.

f) Masters in Business Administration (MBA)

There is always someone in the family who will advise you to pursue MBA. A good career in MBA totally depends on the credibility of the institute that you are pursuing from. If you are an IIM student then success will follow you to your doorsteps but doing MBA from an ordinary and not much renowned institute will only add numbers to the list of unemployed MBAs. The results of your CAT exams determine the institute where you can pursue the MBA program. It is a two year program on completion of which you can easily get job in financial service sector.

g) Certified Public Accounting (CPA)

Minimum qualification for Company Certified Public Accounting (CPA) A Certified Public Accountant (CPA) is the highest standard of competence in the field of Accountancy across the globe. The exam is administered by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA), which is the world's largest accounting body. A CPA qualification is similar to the Indian CA qualification. In addition to the CA qualification, a CPA will have knowledge of US Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), IFRS (International Financial Reporting Standards), Generally Accepted Accounting Standards (GAAS), US federal taxation and business laws. This gives great advantage to a CPA when working with US Based Financial firms or Indian firms working for US clients. This exam consists of 4 exams which can be completed within a period of less than a year.

h) Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA)

With 5000+ domestic jobs daily, Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) is the highest standard of professional excellence in the investment industry and a globally recognized qualification offered by CFA Institute. Holding a CFA charter will also help make your dream of moving abroad easier and smoother.

i) Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA)

ACCA (Association of Chartered Certified Accountants) is the world's leading and fastest-growing international accountancy organization with 162, 000 members and 428, 000 students in 173 countries. The ACCA qualification helps develop successful careers in the fields of accounting, banking, management and consulting, and is a major advantage in competing for senior roles. ACCA is considered to be very similar to CA but ACCA program provides you with additional knowledge about UK GAAP, IFRS and laws which makes ACCA superior to CA. To successfully complete your ACCA program you will need to clear 14 papers.

j) Actuarial Science

The much hyped course remains untapped due to the myth of its difficulty. This course requires high mathematical and statistical skills to understand, assess and solve problems related to the financial impact of risk and uncertainty. After successful completion of this course, jobs can be found in insurance sector, financial services, banking and with financial funds.

k) Diploma Courses

Finally, you can go for various available diploma courses, which will provide you a platform to enter corporate and government jobs. Diploma Courses in Treasury and Forex management, Merchant Banking, Financial Services, Export-Import, Foreign trade etc. can help you in building your good profile

A teacher can also learn to guide the children and counsel them in solving their personal and academic problems. The course ensures job security, job satisfaction and also good pay packages. PROSPECTS AFTER B. ED.

a) M.Ed. Or MA in Education after which he/ she can get jobs in B.Ed. Colleges. M.Ed. is a regular course whereas MA Education can be done both correspondently and regularly. Teaching Jobs as TGT and PGT teachers in Govt as well as private schools. Obviously this is the first and foremost thing you can do after B.Ed. There are two categories of teaching posts you can get after doing your B.Ed. First is of TGTs (Masters / Mistresses). For getting the jobs as TGT, the candidates need to do Graduation and then B.Ed. in the concerned subjects. These teachers are expected to teach from 6th to 10th classes. If you are PG in any of the subjects and then you do your B.Ed. in the concerned subject, you can apply for PGT Posts. For that you must have 50% in the PG Degree. The CTET is mandatory to become teachers in the school. After doing B.Ed. you must focus on the CTET Examination.

b) Online Tutors

Online tutoring can also be opted after completion of your B.Ed. and you can specialize in providing online tuitions for 6th to 12th grade students that covers, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Economics, Statistics, languages and so on. Each tutoring session can be customized as per student's requirements. Making extensive use of digital white boards, audio and video to make the tuition more interactive and effective is a good option. Every session can be recorded to help students to review it in later stage.

c) Education Consultant

One who is an independent consultant and helps parents, students and organizations with educational planning. They are classed as "educational, vocational, and school counselors. These consultants are, however, normally self-employed (or are part of consulting firms), while school counselors are employed by a school.

d) Education Counselor

One who manages to get the job of Counselor in any of the prestigious institutions, here the job will be to provide counseling to the students in need. You can also have private office as a Counselor.

e) Education Officer

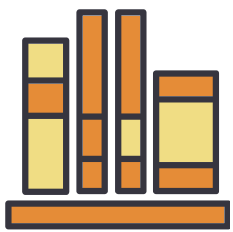

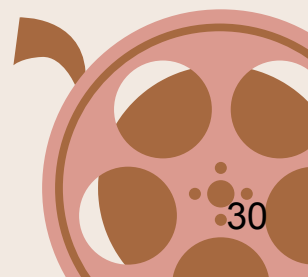
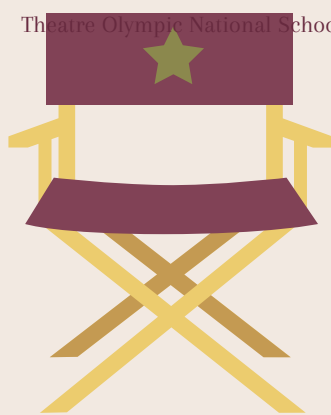

Enactus has been busy with a large-scale campaign on pride month and project Pankhudi. Apart from that they also have two major projects in the pipeline for the coming months.

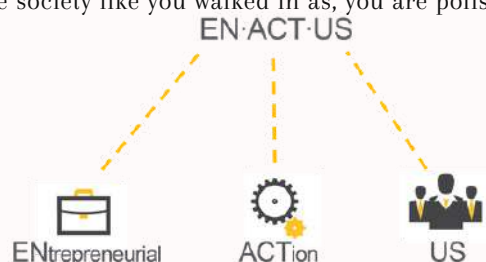
Even though with a handful of projects the work life balance is given a lot of importance, assignments and tasks vary according to the development they are working in or the project they have chosen to work in.

THE TECHNICAL SOCIETY

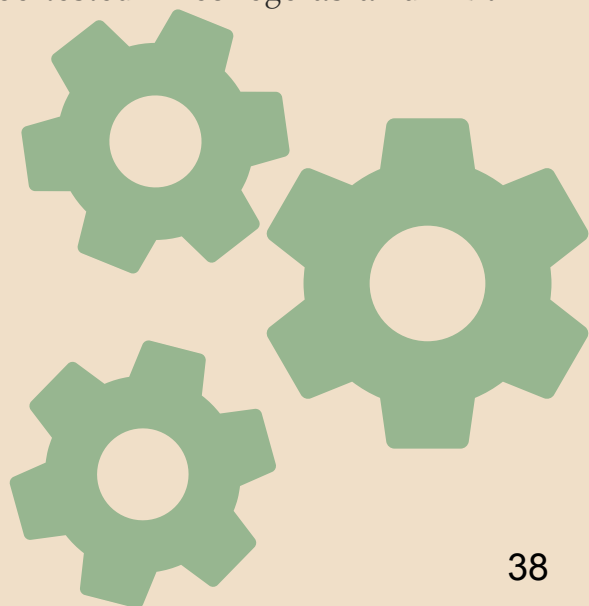
"Find a problem and come up with solutions using an app or a website."



Academics is never a problem with the society members with rules such as time off during their exams and sufficient time for personal commitments so that it does not hamper their daily routine.

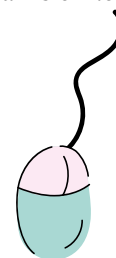
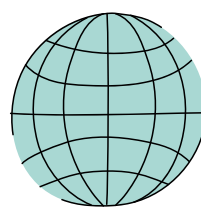
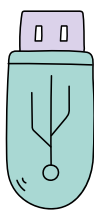
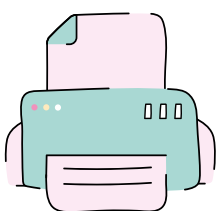

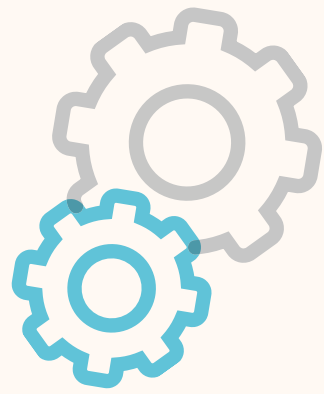
The academic year asks for a minimum time investment where members practice and prepare songs for the competitions.

THE ENTREPRENEURSHIP CELL

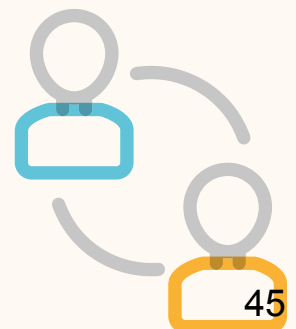

- To visit field trips or donation drives, when the pandemic situation improves.

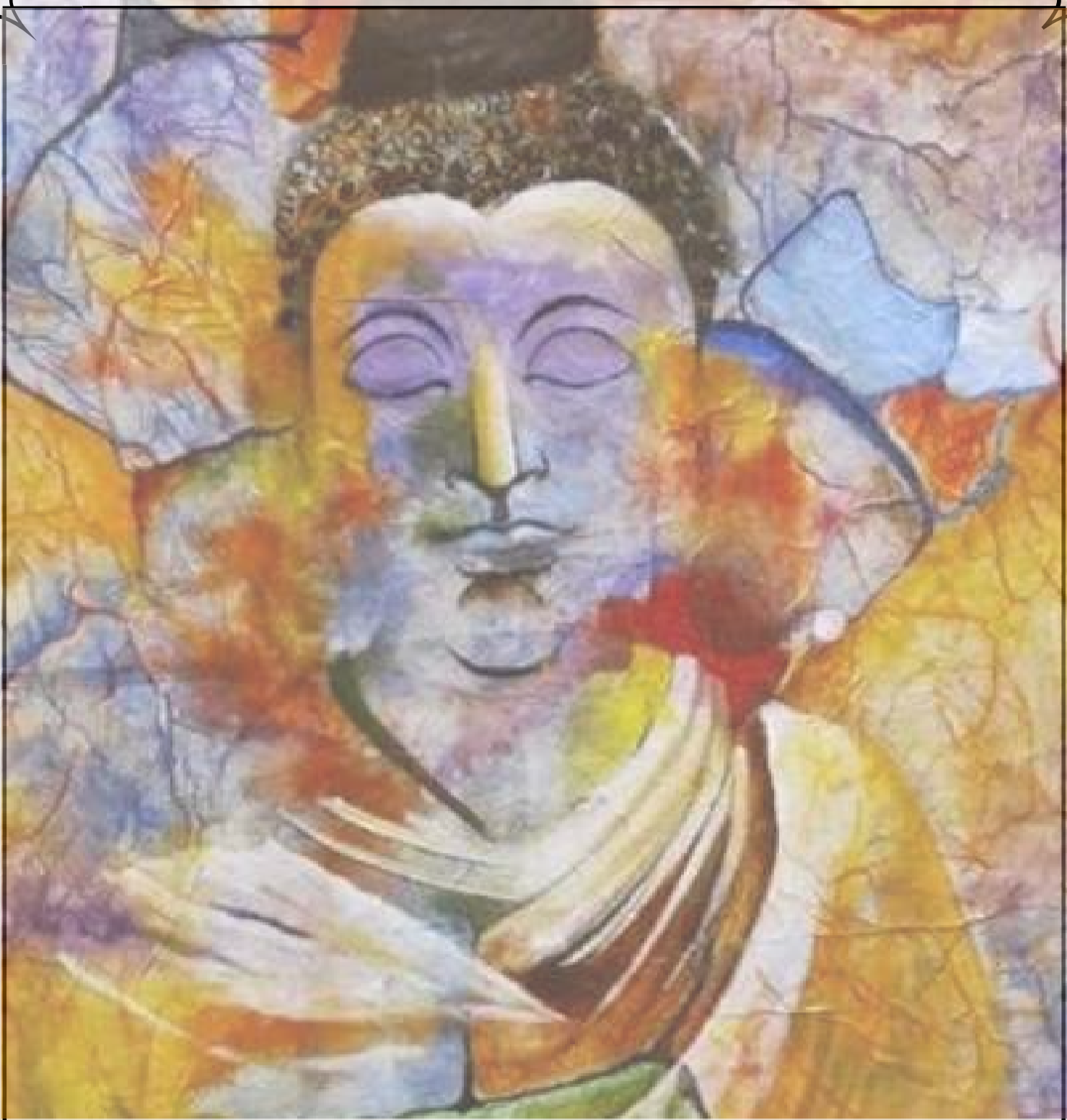

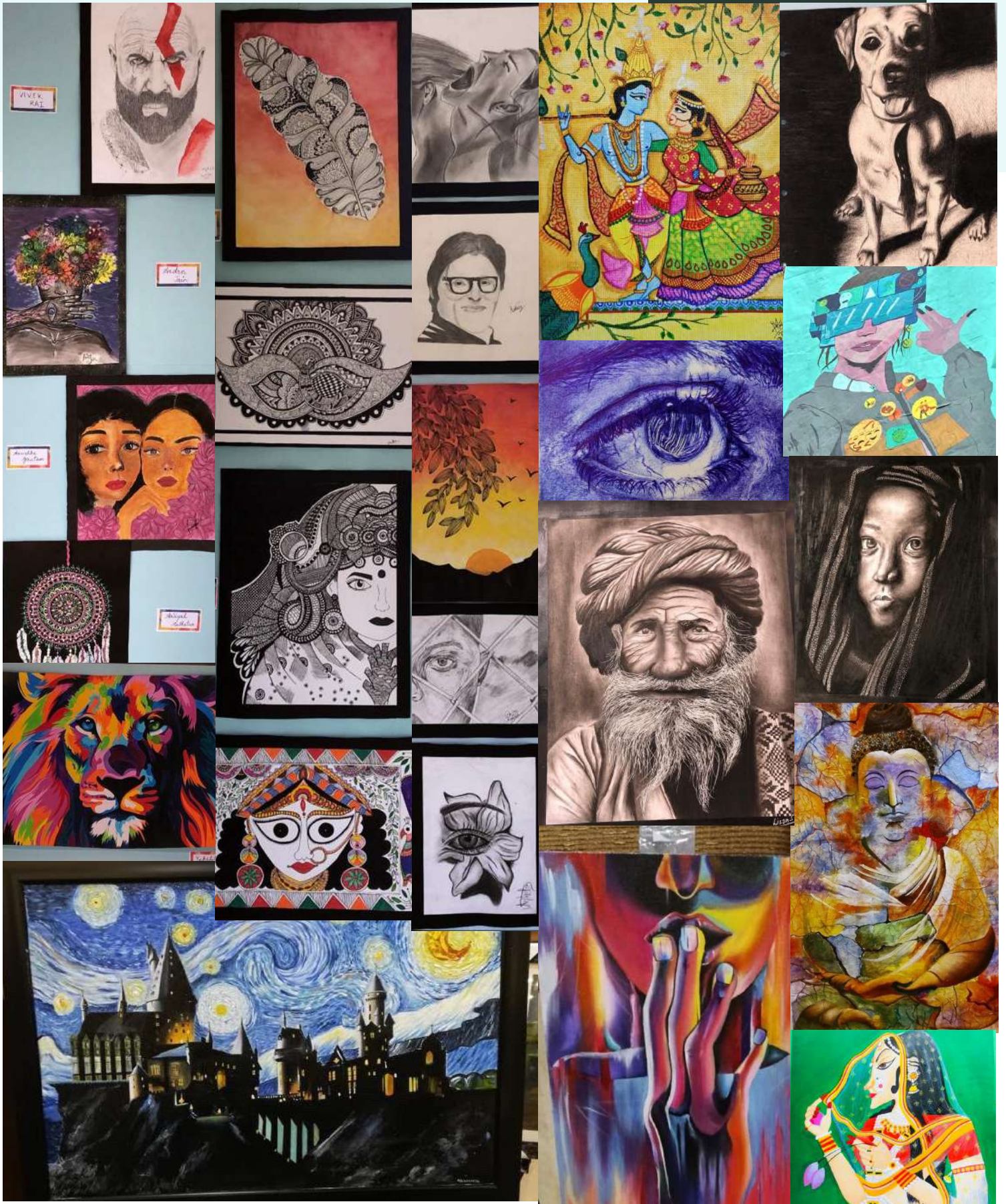

BIG DATA

Big data is a field that treats ways to analyze, systematically extract information from, or otherwise deal with data sets that are too large or complex to be dealt with by traditional data-processing application software. Data with many fields (columns) offer greater statistical power, while data with higher complexity (more attributes or columns) may lead to a higher false discovery rate. Big data analysis challenges include capturing data, data storage, data analysis, search, sharing, transfer, visualization, querying, updating, information privacy and data source. Big data was originally associated with three key concepts: volume, variety, and velocity. The analysis of big data presents challenges in sampling, and thus previously allowing for only observations and sampling. Therefore, big data often includes data with sizes that exceed the capacity of traditional software to process within an acceptable time and value.

Current usage of the term big data tends to refer to the use of predictive analytics, user behavior analytics, or certain other advanced data analytics methods that extract value from big data, and seldom to a particular size of data set. "There is little doubt that the quantities of data now available are indeed large, but that's not the most relevant characteristic of this new data ecosystem." Analysis of data sets can find new correlations to "spot business trends, prevent diseases, combat crime and so on." Scientists, business executives, medical practitioners, advertising and governments alike regularly meet difficulties with large data-sets in areas including Internet searches, fintech, healthcare analytics, geographic information systems, urban informatics, and business informatics. Scientists encounter limitations in e-Science work, including meteorology, genomics, connectomics, complex physics simulations, biology and environmental research.

The size and number of available data sets has grown rapidly as data is collected by devices such as mobile devices, cheap and numerous information-sensing Internet of things devices, aerial (remote sensing), software logs, cameras, microphones, radio-frequency identification (RFID) readers and wireless sensor networks. The world's technological per-capita capacity to store information has roughly doubled every 40 months since the 1980s; as of 2012, every day 2.5 exabytes (2.5×260 bytes) of data are generated. Based on an IDC report prediction, the global data volume was predicted to grow exponentially from 4.4 zettabytes to 44 zettabytes between 2013 and 2020. By 2025, IDC predicts there will be 163 zettabytes of data. One question for large enterprises is determining who should own big-data initiatives that affect the entire organization.

Relational database management systems and desktop statistical software packages used to visualize data often have difficulty processing and analyzing big data. The processing and analysis of big data may require "massively parallel software running on tens, hundreds, or even thousands of servers". What qualifies as "big data" varies depending on the capabilities of those analyzing it and their tools. Furthermore, expanding capabilities make big data a moving target. "For some organizations, facing hundreds of gigabytes of data for the first time may trigger a need to reconsider data management options. For others, it may take tens or hundreds of terabytes before data size becomes a significant consideration."

WHAT IS A NON-PERFORMING ASSET?

A non-performing asset (NPA) is a classification used by financial institutions for loans and advances on which the principal is past due and on which no interest payments have been made for a period of time. In general, loans become NPAs when they are outstanding for 90 days or more, though some lenders use a shorter window in considering a loan or advance past due. A loan is classified as a non-performing asset when it is not being repaid by the borrower. It results in the asset no longer generating income for the lender or bank because the interest is not being paid by the borrower. In such a case, the loan is considered “in arrears.”

Example - Suppose the ABC Bank gives a loan of 10 crores to XYZ company. Consider that they agreed upon for an interest rate of say 10% per annum. Now suppose that initially everything was good and the market forces were working in support to the industry, therefore, XYZ Co. was able to service the interest amount. Later, due to administrative, technical or corporate reasons suppose the company is not able to pay the interest rates for 90 days. In that case, a loan given to the XYZ Co. is a good case for the consideration as NPA.

Sub-Classifications for Non-Performing Assets (NPAs)

Lenders usually provide a grace period before classifying an asset as non-performing. Afterward, the lender or bank will categorize the NPA into one of the following sub-categories:

1. Standard Assets

They are NPAs that have been past due for anywhere from 90 days to 12 months, with a normal risk level.

2. Sub-Standard Assets

They are NPAs that have been past due for more than 12 months. They have a significantly higher risk level, combined with a borrower that has less than ideal credit. Banks usually assign a haircut (reduction in market value) to such NPAs because they are less certain that the borrower will eventually repay the full amount.

3. Doubtful Debts

Non-performing assets in the doubtful debts category have been past due for at least 18 months. Banks generally have serious doubts that the borrower will ever repay the full loan. This class of NPA seriously affects the bank's own risk profile.

4. Loss Assets

These are non-performing assets with an extended period of nonpayment. With this class, banks are forced to accept that the loan will never be repaid, and must record a loss on their balance sheet. The entire amount of the loan must be written off completely.

How NPAs Work :-

Loans, as addressed above, are not switched into the NPA category until a considerable period of non-payment has passed. Lenders consider all of the factors that may make a borrower late on making interest and principal payments and extend a grace period.

After a month or so, banks typically consider a loan overdue. It is not until the end of the grace period (typically, 90 days of non-payment) that the loan then becomes a non-performing asset.

Banks may attempt to collect the outstanding debt by foreclosing on whatever property or asset has been used to secure the loan. For example, if an individual takes out a second mortgage and that loan becomes an NPA, the bank will generally send notice of foreclosure on the home because it is being used as collateral for the loan.

How Serious Is India's NPA Issue :-

More than 7 lakh crore worth loans are classified as Non Performing Loans in India. The figure roughly translates to near 10% of all loans given, resulting in substantial loss of money to the banks. NPA crisis in India is set to worsen. Restructuring norms are being misused. This bad performance is not a good sign and can result in crashing of banks as happened in the sub-prime crisis of 2008 in the United States of America. Also, the NPA problem in India is worst when comparing other emerging economies in BRICS.

What are the various steps taken to tackle NPAs?

The Debt Recovery Tribunals (DRTs) - 1993

To decrease the time required for settling cases. They are governed by the provisions of the Recovery of Debt Due to Banks and Financial Institutions Act, 1993. However, their number is not sufficient & they also suffer from time lag and cases are pending for more than 2-3 years in many areas.

Credit Information Bureau – 2000 : A good information system is required to prevent loan falling into bad hands and therefore prevention of NPAs. It helps banks by maintaining and sharing data of individual defaulters and willful defaulters.

Lok Adalats – 2001 : They are helpful in tackling and recovery of small loans however they are limited up to 5 lakh rupees loans only by the RBI guidelines issued in 2001. They are positive in the sense that they avoid more cases into the legal system.

Compromise Settlement – 2001 : It provides a simple mechanism for recovery of NPA for the advances below Rs. 10 Crores. It covers lawsuits with courts and DRTs (Debt Recovery Tribunals) however willful default and fraud cases are excluded.

SARFAESI Act – 2002 : The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest (SARFAESI) Act, 2002 – The Act permits Banks / Financial Institutions to recover their NPAs without the involvement of the Court, through acquiring and disposing of the secured assets in NPA accounts with an outstanding amount of Rs. 1 lakh and above. The banks have to first issue a notice. Then, on the borrower's failure to repay, they can:

1. Take ownership of security and/or
2. Control over the management of the borrowing concern.
3. Appoint a person to manage the concern.

Further, this act has been amended last year to make its enforcement faster.

ARC (Asset Reconstruction Companies) : The RBI gave license to 14 new ARCs recently after the amendment of the SARFAESI Act of 2002. These companies are created to unlock value from stressed loans. Before this law came, lenders could enforce their security interests only through courts, which was a time-consuming process.

Corporate Debt Restructuring – 2005 : It is for reducing the burden of the debts on the company by decreasing the rates paid and increasing the time the company has to pay the obligation back.

5:25 rule – 2014 : Also known as, Flexible Structuring of Long Term Project Loans to Infrastructure and Core Industries. It was proposed to maintain the cash flow of such companies since the project timeline is long and they do not get the money back into their books for a long time, therefore, the requirement of loans at every 5-7 years and thus refinancing for long term projects.

Joint Lenders Forum – 2014

It was created by the inclusion of all PSBs whose loans have become stressed. It is present so as to avoid loan to the same individual or company from different banks. It is formulated to prevent the instances where one person takes a loan from one bank to give a loan of the other bank.

A regular productive, daily routine with sufficient breaks to relax, learn and rejuvenate must be followed. Staying connected with friends and family also boosts our morale and vigor. To handle negative and obnoxious thoughts we must be more conscious of them, keep our selves busy, avoid triggers, can listen to music etc. Make time to unwind and remind yourself that strong feelings will fade.

Are you always short of time? Do you wish you had more than 24 hours in a day? Well, if you make a list of things that lead to your poor time management, you will find a monster in it - Procrastination!

Procrastination has become one of the major challenges for professionals and individuals alike in managing time. The question is how can we stop procrastination? If procrastination is a problem for us, it is important that we learn tools to handle our procrastination. Procrastination occurs when we are faced with too many decisions and are unable to complete matters of importance. There are many reasons why we avoid doing things, sometimes it seems strange that we know what we have to do to be successful but we don't do it. Mark Twain once said that, if the first thing you do each morning is to eat a live frog, you can go through the day with the satisfaction of knowing that it is probably the worst thing that is going to happen to you all day long! In his best seller book, "Eat That Frog", Brian Tracy talks about several ways to stop procrastination. He says, our "frog" is our biggest, "most important task", the one we are most likely to procrastinate on if we don't do something about it. It might be the one task that can have the greatest positive impact on our lives and results. Hence the first rule of frog eating is this: if you have to eat two frogs, eat the ugliest one first! This is another way of saying that if we have two important tasks before us, start with the biggest, hardest, and most important ones first. The second rule of frog eating is: if we have to eat a live frog at all, it doesn't pay to sit and look at it for very long!

The key to happiness, satisfaction, great success, and a wonderful feeling of personal power and effectiveness is for us to develop the habit of eating your frog first thing each day when we start work. Brian Tracy says this is a learnable skill and we can acquire it through practice.

According to him here are the great ways to stop procrastinating and get more things done faster:

1. **Set the Table:** Decide exactly what we want. Write out our goals and objectives before we begin.
2. **Plan every day in advance:** Think on paper. Every minute we spend in planning can save five or ten minutes in execution.
3. **Apply the 80/20 rule to everything:** 20% of our activities will account for 80% of our results. Always concentrate our efforts on that top 20%.
4. **Practice creative procrastination:** Since we can't-do everything, we must learn to deliberately put off those tasks that are of low value so that we have enough time to do the few things that really count.
5. **Focus on key result areas:** Identify and determine those results that we absolutely, positively have to get to do our job well, and work on all day long.
6. **The law of three:** Identify the three things we do in our work that account for 90% of our contribution and focus on getting them done before anything else.
7. **Prepare thoroughly before we begin:** Have everything we need at hand before we start. Assemble all papers, information, tools, work materials, etc. we might require so we can get started and keep going.
8. **Take it one oil barrel at a time:** We can accomplish the biggest and most complicated job if we just complete it one step at a time.
9. **Leverage our key skills:** The more knowledgeable and skilled we become at our key tasks, the faster we start them and the sooner we get them done.
10. **Identify our key constraints:** Determine the bottlenecks or choke points, internal or external that set the speed at which we achieve our most important goals, and focus on alleviating them.
11. **Put the pressure on ourselves:** Imagine that we have to leave town for a month, and work as if we had to get all our major tasks completed before we leave.
12. **Motivate ourselves into action:** Be our own cheerleader. Look for the good in every situation. Focus on a solution than a problem.
13. **Get out of the technological time sinks:** Use technology to improve the quality of our communications, but do not allow ourselves to become a slave to it.
14. **Slice and dice the task:** Break large, complex tasks down into bite-sized pieces, and then do just one small part of the task to get started.
15. **Develop a sense of urgency:** Make a habit of moving fast on our key tasks. Become known as a person who does things quickly and well.

I am sure you must have come across several articles teaching us how to stop procrastination. Sometimes, we follow it, and some other times we lose track after a certain time. It's all about being disciplined and strong-willed regarding managing this crucial aspect of our lives in an efficient way. The best way to do it just starts the new regime with immediate effect. Once we are successful in overcoming procrastination - "the villain in time management", we will find more time at our disposal and we will emerge as a winner in every phase of our life.

In the epic "Mahabharata", addressing King Yudhishtira, Bhishma said, "the one that provides for the future, and the one who possesses the presence of mind, always enjoy happiness. The man of procrastination, however, is the loser".

So unlike us, just try to complete your work before time so that you can proceed for another one.....

Life of Army Men - Till the last shot's fired

"Serving in the Army is not a job. It cannot be a job. Army officers are well qualified to get any top-ranking job in the world. But working in the Army is about love. It's a passion. You do it for the pride and honor of your country."

What is The Army? Army, a largely assembled regiment trained and armed for war, essentially on land. The term may pertain to a large faction assembled for independent action, or it may also pertain to a nation's entire military organization for land warfare. In the life of Army Men, it is like a crime to confess to the burden and pressure he encounters in front of anyone, let alone the media. Our men never sob or make their hardships public. They are people, who are always positive to the core even in the most downbeat circumstances.

A career in the armed forces comes with its perks but responsibilities too; The army provides an extraordinary workplace and also motivates its men to take part in their fields of interest like Drama, Sports, and Music. Although, It's not just about perks and promotions; there are several issues that on a day-to-day basis take a heavy toll on an army officer and his family, emotionally as well as mentally.

Army Life Life in the army starts at around 4 O'clock in the Morning when army men start with their physical training and post that the working hours go up to 4 to 5 in the evening, depending on the border scenarios of the country. During this training period, the cadets have to operate on little to no sleep and have a punctilious routine to follow including runs with a full battle load on their backs and speed marches. And these same routines are practiced every day for long hours.

The struggles for army men begin at the training level. The schedule is tough with absolutely zero tolerance for mistakes and leaves little time for rest. And these same routines are practiced every day for long hours. But, what makes everything valuable are the satisfactions. Every single cadet coming out of army training is impeccable with style and manners. They know the correct way to talk, walk, dine, and dress. An officer also gets a traveling allowance after every 4 years in which the government undertakes all the traveling charges of the family.

What do they face? There are occasions of couples staying together only for 3 to 4 years after 11 to 12 years of marriage. The rest of the time goes into the field tenures. An often incident is of children referring to their fathers as "uncles" when they come back home after a long period. By the time the children get used to their brand new "dads", it is time to say goodbye to them again. Life in the military is intense, securing our nation's outskirts 16,000 feet above ocean level at a temperature of - 50 degrees at the Siachen Glacier, or battling a temperature of 50 degrees in the scorching heat of Rajasthan.

When an army cadet goes on posting he, along with his family, has to stay for 3 to 4 months in a room provided by the officer's mess because temporary housing is allocated only after a period of 3 to 4 months. By the time spacious and comfortable permanent housing is allocated, the next posting is due once again.

Think about the time when there's a war happening, while all of us are busy choosing sides, or praying for peace, it's these army officers that are busy fighting bullets at the border in the middle of all the growing tension and ceasefire infringement.

Life in the armed forces isn't easy at all. There's a new challenge waiting for them every day. And the challenges they face aren't just from the enemies but from nature too. They're far away from their loved ones, fighting for their as well as our lives every single day. But it's the spirit of these men and their undying love for their country that keeps them going.

Perks in the Armed Forces :- There are many reasons why a person might want to join the Armed Forces:

Job Security - They have high job security, and there are no pay cuts even if the economy of the country fails.

Pay and Allowances - The newly commissioned officers in the forces make about 42,000 rupees per month. The other allowances also include flying pay, island allowance, and many more.

Respect everywhere you go - Being a part of the armed forces is itself a great feeling of pride and honor, and wherever you go people begin to see you as a role model.

Great post-retirement options - The government of the country ensures that the army officers live a smooth life after their retirement by providing them with great post-retirement facilities.

Personal Life of an Army Men :- Army Officers and their families are brought up in such a way that they get adjusted to all the upcoming postings and other changes. It's just at the hour of a field posting, because of both security and educational reasons an officer needs to leave his family back home and move alone. 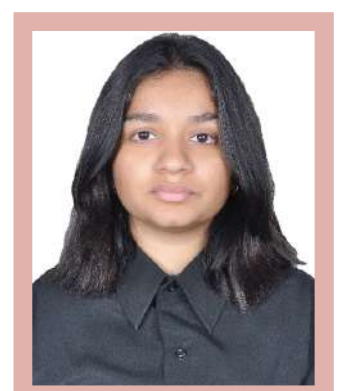

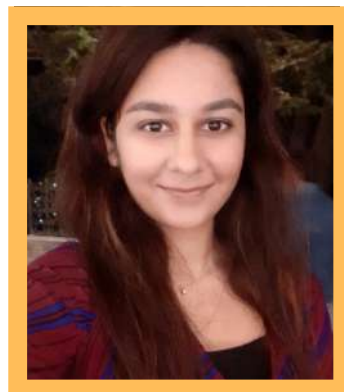

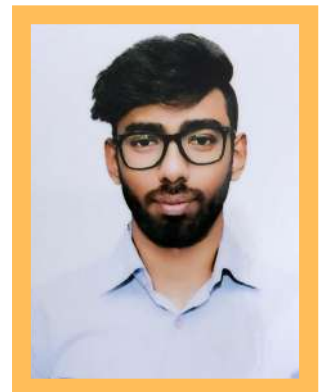

7. Sifar Act Mini Matchbox

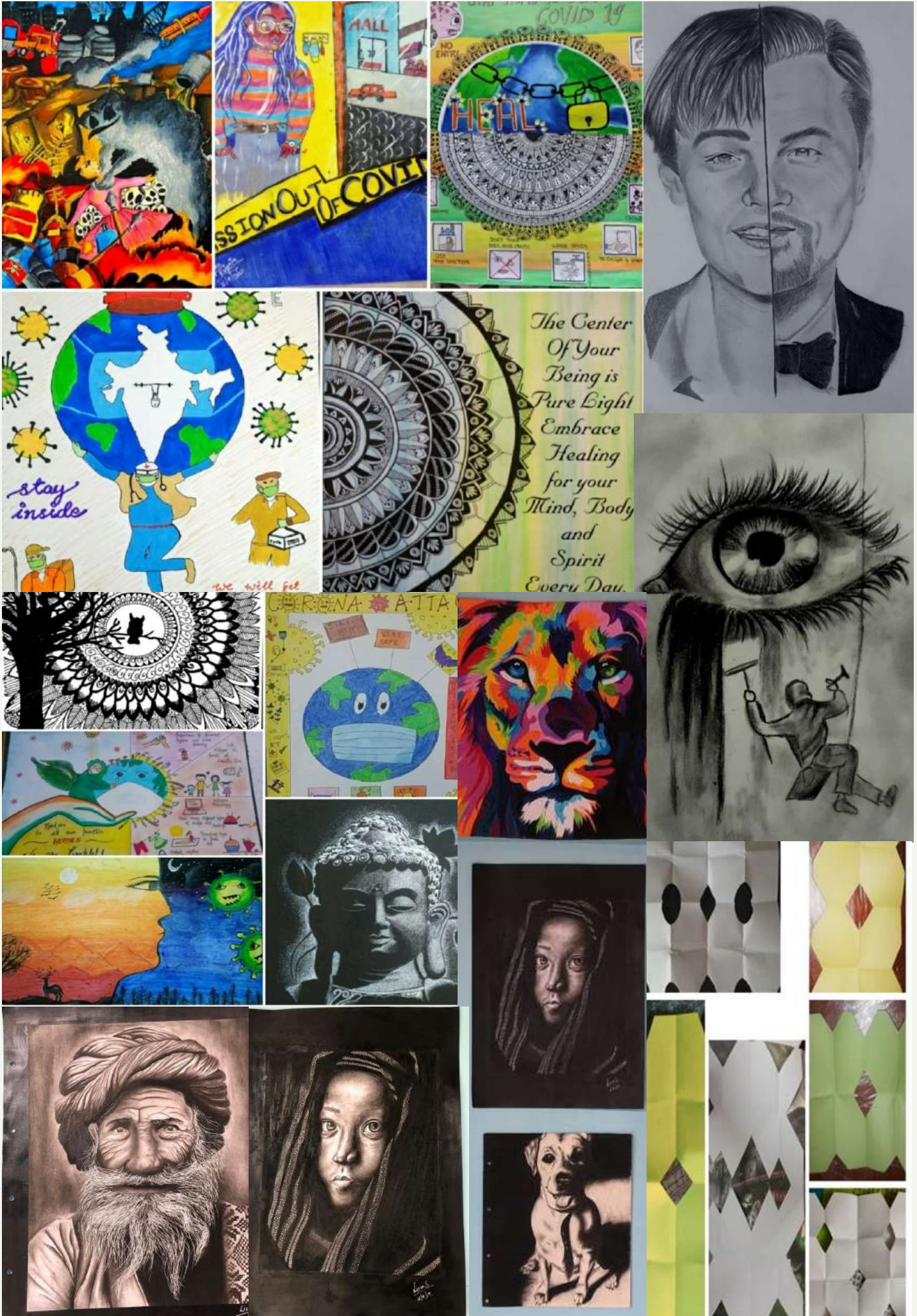
February 21, 2021
