MAHARAJA SURAJMAL : A GREAT JAT KING



Among the Rajput kings of the eighteenth century, the only Jat king who is counted as the hero of history was Maharaja Surajmal of Bharatpur. Syed Ghulam Ali, the author of the Persian monograph "Imadussadat", who called him the most intelligent and skilled ruler of his era, had entitled him "the Plato of India", because it was Surajmal, who defeated the Mughals and Marathas, and even their Rajput allies, on his strength. Dreamed of creating an independent, secure, and prosperous Hindu state he was the most politically savvy, ethical, and efficient ruler of his era. Surajmal was born on 13 February 1707, as a son of Jat Chief Badan Singh of Bharatpur. Father named him Sujan (intelligent and skillful), but he became famous in history

by the name of Surajmal. Badan Singh himself was also an able, brave, and accomplished person, and by his political acumen and bravery and by receiving the favor of Raja Jai Singh, the chief feudatory of the Mughal court and the most eminent leader of Rajputana. Jai Singh was the great opponent of the Jat people but Badan Singh managed to get not only his grace but succeeded in obtaining 25 villages, and remained successful in establishing his independent kingdom, and with his help got success in obtaining the title of 'Rao Raja' for himself and 'Kunwar' for his son Surajmal from the Mughal Court. Badan Singh gathered the Jats under one banner and raised a strong army. The forts of Deeg and Kumbher were built and to please Jai Singh, the foundation of the first fort was laid by his hands. He had recognized the merit of his son Surajmal since childhood and trained him very well. Surjamal was the most deserving of all his sons.

When Badan Singh's sight deteriorated, all the responsibilities of governance were given to Surajmal. who assumed the reins of the Bharatpur kingdom as a defacto ruler. He acquired new territories for his state, but the hallmark of his approach was to restrict his endeavors in spreading his influence only to territories largely dominated by the Jats, who thought of republican propensities, accepted and timed went with the monarchial ruler. Physically, he was taller than usual and robust, of a rather dark complexion and quite fat. He had extremely twinkling and awe-inspiring eyes. His whole physiognomy showed more of fire than what was noticeable in his conduct, which was amiable, gentle, generous, and considerate. Though he had several queens, including the famous Rani Kishori and Rani Hansia, he was not given to debauchery and dissipation. Because of his ability to govern, Badan Singh declared him the crown prince.

Born in a marital community, Surajmal had acquired the reputation of a great warrior and strategist of high order at a young age. He was gifted with a variety of military talents which vigorously supported his character in his many engagements. No danger wavered his courage and resolutions as no success filled him with presumption or vanity. Along with bravery and courage, he displayed a remarkable sense of realism, both in war and politics. He fought many battles but, indeed, he never lost a single. However, Surajmal was well aware of the devastation that war brought to the common people. He was perfect in handling situations that could lead the war. His best talent came out in moments of crisis and turbulence. He kept his cool and baffled his contemporaries with his adroit diplomatic moves on many occasions precariously placed as he was between Ahmad Shah Abdali on the North and the Marathas on the South, and had to continuously deal with the established Rajputs and the Mughals. Abdali invaded India in December 1756, looting and crushing people in the way swooped down on the imperial capital, Delhi, in January 1757 without meeting any effective resistance on his way. The invader methodically sacked, tortured, and outraged the populace of the capital. The Emperor Alamgir was deposed, the Vazier imprisoned and the Vizarat conferred upon

Intizam-ud-Daula on his promise of giving two crores to Abdali. Abdali wrote to Surajmal ordering him to disgorge his acquisitions, pay money, and attend Abdali's court personally. Surajmal had sought help from Imad, the Marathas, and Shuja Amidst the circumstances Surajmal resorted to dilatory tactics. He sent his Vakil to discuss terms and bribe the Afghan Court but really to gain time to explore the possibility of an allied front against the invader. But the Rajput and the notable Muslim potentates were reluctant, only the Marathas remained, whom Surajmal looked forward to in his adversity. Abdali left Delhi and moved slowly into the boundaries of the Jat, slaying and plundering every village and town held by Surajmal up to Agra. But when he could not scare the Jat, he returned to Delhi without touching his forts. Finally, Abdali sent a letter to the Jat king through one Jugal Kishore with an officer in a bid to extract money from Surajmal. Surajmal wrote back in sarcastic though polished language. The contents and tone of the tenor of his letter to Abdali are seen by experts as the finest example of diplomacy.

Finally, the third battle of Panipat was fought. Surajmal was willing to fight against Abdali, but the Maratha general Sadashiv Rao Bhau not only ridiculed his practical and empirical proposals but also insulted him by calling him a modest Jat peasant. While the other Maratha Generals - Holkar, Sindhia, and Bhosle fully agreed with Surajmal's plan. Tired of his repeated insults, they thought it proper to advise Surajmal to leave the camp of Bhau and return to Bharatpur. As a result, the Marathas were badly defeated in the battle of Panipat. They had neither food grains, nor were they familiar with the area and the spoken dialect, which was different from their familiar Hindi. Above this, there was a severe winter and their families were with them. To avoid the destruction from the enemy, about one lakh Maratha people ran towards the Jat state. The injured, hungry and thirsty, shivering from the severe cold and on the verge of death, those fugitives received generous and hospitality treatment in the Jat state. Forgetting the mistakes of the Maratha General, the great Jat king made arrangements for their stay, food, clothes, and blankets, and provided medical facilities. Rani Kishori was personally engaged in their service day and night. After keeping free arrangements for the fugitives in Bharatpur for about ten days, Surajmal sent them safely to Gwalior and Maharashtra under the protection of his army. Every normal person was provided flour, jaggery, clothes, and one rupee for the way. The compassionate king spent as much as twenty lakh of rupees from his pocket in humanitarian service. Among the fugitives were also Parwati Bai, the young wife of Sadashiv Rao Bhau, and his half-brother Shamsher Bahadur. Kishori gave daughter-in-law-like affection to the broken-hearted Parwati Bai. Consoled her, performed all the religious rituals for her dead husband, and made arrangements for her safe return to Maharashtra. Marathas are still grateful for this.

It was due to his tireless efforts that at the time of his sudden demise, the Jat kingdom was nearly 325 km. in length had spread 225 km in breadth, and was called the richest state of India. After the battle of Panipat, he again tried to establish peace in the country with the help of Marathas and Rohillas, but the cunning Rohilla Chief Najib deceitfully attacked him at the western bank of Hindon River on 25 December 1763 and killed the king.





Maybe you hardly even remember certain conversations that you were engaged in, meals you enjoyed, or music that you listened to as you were sub consciously loaded with impressions of the social media content, it is not healthy for our minds and bodies to operate like this day in and day out. Our day begins with checking our social media feeds and ends with watching baseless reels on Instagram. It makes sense then that we hear from "Mindfulness" in today's world more than ever before. I think everyone would agree with the idea that the more high-speed and technologically driven our environment becomes, the more important it is to slow down.

Historically, the origin of Mindfulness in the United States is attributed to Jon Kabat-Zinn in the 1970s, a professor and the creator of the Stress Reduction Clinic and the Centre for Medicine, Healthcare, and Society at the University of Massachusetts Medical School. Kabat-Zinn was first introduced to Buddhist philosophy while he was a student at MIT, which acted as a catalyst in his work in and understanding of Mindfulness practices. He defines Mindfulness as "the psychological process of one's attention to the internal and external experiences occurring in the present moment, which can be developed through the practice of mediation and other training." Mindfulness involves paying attention to the present moment with acceptance and without judgment. It's about being fully aware of your thoughts, feelings, and sensations as they arise.

It is possible to train yourself to focus on the present moment. You become aware of what is going on inside and around you-your thoughts, feelings, sensations and environments. You observe these moments without judgment. In recent years, Mindfulness has become a household term and its importance is realised so much that Mindfulness programs are now commonly found in schools, colleges, workplaces, and hospitals. There are various methods of practicing mindfulness. Mindfulness can involve sitting meditation that is practised in a quiet space. In this practice, you focus on your breathing or sensation in your body. If your body wanders-like thoughts popping in about things you need to do-you try to return your mind to the present moment. But Mindfulness doesn't have to be done sitting still or in silence. You can integrate the practice into things you do every day, like walking or eating. You can also be mindful while interacting with others.

There are various sources to acquaint with mindfulness in your daily life, namely, traditional practices (Ancient texts like the Bhagavad Gita, Yoga Sutras of Patanjali, and Buddhist scriptures); books (e.g. "Wherever You Go, There You Are" by Jon Kabat-Zinn, "The Miracle of Mindfulness" by Thich Nhat Hanh, and "10% Happier" by Dan Harris.); mobile apps (e.g. Headspace, Calm, Insight Timer, and Stop, Breathe & Think); online courses (e.g. Coursera, Udemy, and Mindful Schools); meditation centres (Art of Living International Center, Isha Yoga Center, and Vipassana Meditation Centers); yoga studios and community workshops and events.

Mindfulness benefits for youth.

Meditation has been shown to offer many benefits. Laws Available to Women and Children in Live-In Relationship in India

Live-in relationships entail cohabitation between individuals, whether of the same or different sexes, resembling a married couple without the formal status of marriage. Recognising this arrangement, the Supreme Court of India, in S.Khushboo v/s Kanaimmal & Anr on April 28, 2010, affirmed its legality under Articles 19(1)(e) and 21 of the Indian Constitution, which guarantee the right to reside and settle anywhere in India, as well as the right to life and personal liberty, respectively.

In terms of legal governance, women in live-in relationships are subject to various laws, including the Hindu Marriage Act of 1955 (in exceptional cases), the Domestic Violence Act of 2005, the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act 2005, and its 2013 amendment. Children born from such unions are governed by the Hindu Succession Act of 1956 and its subsequent amendment in 2005.

Children born out of live-in relationships possess rights to legitimacy, custody, maintenance, property, and inheritance, as established by the Supreme Court in Tulsa & Ors. v/s Durghatiya & Ors. on January 15, 2008. They are not considered illegitimate solely due to their parents' unmarried status and enjoy similar rights as children born within wedlock. Also, such children are entitled to claim maintenance under sec. 125 CrPC.

Women cohabiting with a male without marriage are also protected by law.

In the case of Indra Samra v/s V.K.V Sharma 2013, the Supreme Court held that Live-in relationships are deemed akin to marital relationships, entitling women to protection under the Domestic Violence Act of 2005 and its 2013 amendment. The Indian Penal Code of 1860 holds offenders accountable for crimes within such relationships, including rape under Section 376.

Under the Hindu Marriage Act of 1955, women in live-in relationships can claim maintenance if the arrangement resembles a marital relationship and the male partner neglects his obligation. The Supreme Court ruled in 2015 that women in long-term live-in relationships are entitled to maintenance post-separation, despite the lack of formal marriage status.

Property rights are also extended to women in live-in relationships, regardless of marital status. In D. Velusamy v/s D. Patchaiammal, the Supreme Court recognised such unions as valid marriages if evidence suggests a spousal relationship, without specifying a duration.

To safeguard their interests, unmarried cohabiting couples are advised to draft written agreements offering legal protection. While the law increasingly recognises and protects the rights of individuals in live-in relationships, certain aspects, such as defining the duration constituting a "long period," remain open to interpretation.

Recently, BCCI has inaugurated a women's Twenty20 cricket league known as WPL. This league is started just before IPL in 2023. Additionally, Mr. Jay Shah declared prior to the IPL 2023 Playoff's that 500 trees would be planted for each dot ball throughout the playoffs. Given that 294 dots were bowled in the four games, 1, 47, 000 trees would be planted by BCCI.

"Unmasking Human Trafficking: A Closer Look at Modern-Day Slavery"

Human trafficking ranks as the third-largest organized crime globally, following drugs and arms trade. Both men and women, often unaware, fall prey to bonded labor, forced labor, commercial sexual exploitation, and illegal organ trade orchestrated by organized syndicates. Approximately 80% of global human trafficking involves sexual exploitation, violating numerous human rights. Victims endure prolonged exploitation even after their escape, facing dire consequences. Trafficking thrives in countries like India, known for consumer goods production, where the allure of low-cost labour entices traffickers.

As per data from the National Crime Record Bureau, over 8000 cases of human trafficking were reported in India in 2016, and this number has continued to rise annually. West Bengal, due to its three international borders, records the highest incidence of human trafficking cases, accounting for around 40% of the total, followed by Assam, Rajasthan, and Gujarat. The primary reasons for this high prevalence include factors like lack of education, poverty, political instability, corruption, and inadequate legal frameworks. This societal issue often leads to forced marriages, bonded labour, sexual exploitation, organ trade, and sex trafficking.

A notable and horrific case of human trafficking involved the arrest of eight individuals, including five women, for running a trafficking ring that bought and sold newborn children across different states. Law enforcement rescued a trafficked newborn during this operation. Among the accused were men named Piyush Aggarwal, Rajinder, and Raman, along with two women from Delhi and three from Punjab.

Dr BR Ambedkar, the Father of the Indian Constitution, had raised his voice against the denial of education to women. But unfortunately, the birth of a girl child is still considered to be a curse in many Indian families and child marriage is still practised and women are forced into prostitution.

The saddest part of the story is that India is plagued with widespread poverty and lack of proper education in a myriad of human rights violations, especially against women and girls.

In India, the trafficking of humans, involving forced labour, sexual exploitation, domestic servitude, forced marriages, begging, adoption, child pornography, and organ transplantation, is prohibited under Article 23(1) of the Constitution. The Indian Penal Code also addresses this issue through Section 370 and 370A, prohibiting the trafficking of women and girls and prescribing severe penalties for offenders.

Furthermore, the Government of India ratified the International Convention for the Suppression of Immoral Traffic and the Exploitation of Prostitution in 1950. Subsequently, India enacted the Suppression of Immoral Traffic in Women and Girls Act in 1956, which was later amended and renamed the Immoral Traffic Prevention Act, 1986 (ITPA). The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012 aims to safeguard children from sexual abuse, including both penetrative and non-penetrative assault or harassment.

Despite these efforts, human trafficking cases continue to increase, indicating the need for stronger legislation. Institutions such as the National Human Rights Commission should take a more proactive approach by funding research, aiding in law formulation, and ensuring the rights of women and children as per the Constitution, ultimately working towards eradicating human trafficking.

Teens facing identity, academic, and social pressures may experience feelings of loneliness and despair, worsened by social media ideals. Recognizing signs like mood changes and withdrawal is crucial for support and intervention.

Consider your favourite gadgets—smartphone, laptop, tablet, or gaming console—the tools for entertainment and connection with friends. Many teens spend around 8½ hours daily on social media, gaming, and texting,

with younger kids not far behind at 5½ hours. However, much of this screen time, especially on social media, can be distressing rather than enjoyable. The rise in digital media usage correlates with increased feelings of loneliness among teens. Our psychiatrists treating digital addiction encounter cases of teens spending up to 80 hours weekly on screens. Over six years, this adds up to more than 12 years of school!

However, acknowledging depression is only part of the journey. The real beauty lies in the collective effort to nurture resilience and foster a culture of empathy and understanding. It begins with open conversations that destignatize mental health struggles and promote seeking help as a sign of strength, not weakness. Schools, families, healthcare providers, and communities must collaborate to create safe spaces where teenagers feel heard, valued, and supported.

Therapeutic interventions, such as cognitive-behavioral therapy, mindfulness practices, and medication when necessary, can provide adolescents with the tools to navigate their emotions and thought patterns effectively. Equally important is the role of positive relationships and meaningful connections in buffering against the impact of depression. Encouraging healthy lifestyle habits, including regular exercise, adequate sleep, balanced nutrition, and creative outlets, can also contribute to overall well-being. While devices offer exciting adventures in the digital realm, excessive screen time can pose challenges. Achieving a healthy balance in life, including proper nutrition, regular exercise, and sufficient sleep, is key to optimal functioning. Overuse of digital devices can alter thought patterns and behaviours, leading to issues like FOMO and nomophobia. Research indicates that digital addiction during high school can forecast severe mental health issues in college, such as depression, anxiety, and disrupted sleep patterns. College students, grappling with soaring rates of depression and anxiety, often experience sleep disruptions due to constant connectivity. The pervasive fear of missing out drives many to keep phones nearby, disrupting their sleep and exacerbating mental health challenges.

A healthy lifestyle involves exercise like biking or jogging, which boosts brain health and reduces depression. Face-to-face interactions are key for happiness and longevity, while creative hobbies like cooking or playing instruments enhance well-being. Parents should model healthy screen habits, as excessive screen time can harm decision-making. Our research found that a two-week digital break can reverse brain impairments caused by digital addiction, especially for motivated individuals. Balancing screen time with offline activities leads to a more fulfilling life.

किसी भी राष्ट्र के सामाजिक और आर्थिक विकास में महिलाओं की भूमिका को अनदेखा नहीं किया जा सकता। महिला और पुरूष दोनों एक समान रूप से समाज के दो प्रकार के कार्य करते हैं और समाज को प्रगति की ओर ले जाते हैं। दोनों की समान भूमिका को देखते हुए यह आवश्यक हैं कि उन्हें शिक्षा सहित अन्य सभी क्षेत्रों में समान अवसर प्रदान किए जाए. क्योंकि यदि कोई भी एक पक्ष भी बेकार होगा तो सामाजिक प्रगति संभव नहीं होगी। लेकिन देश में ब्यावहारिकता शायद कुछ अलग ही है, साल 2011 के आधार पर देश में महिला की कीमत 64.16 के फीसदी है जबकि पुरूष की कीमत 82.14 फीसदी है। उल्लेखनीय है कि भारत की महिला साक्षरता दर विश्व के औसत 79.7 प्रतिशत से काफी कम है।

भारत में महिला शिक्षा वर्तमान परिदृशः

- भारत में पुरूषों की तुलना में महिलाओं की साक्षरता दर काफी कम है। वर्ष 2011 की जनगणना के आँकड़े दर्शाते है कि राजस्थान (52.12 प्रतिशत) और बिहार (51.50 प्रतिशत) में महिला शिक्षा की स्थिति काफी खराब है।
- जनगणना ऑकड़े यह भी बताते है कि देश की महिला साक्षारता दर 64.46 प्रतिशत, देश की कुल साक्षारता दर 74.
 04 प्रतिशत से भी कम है।
- बहुत कम लडिकयों का स्कूलों में दाखिल कराया जाता है।
 इसके अलावा कई लडिकयां रुढ़िवादी सांस्कृतिक खैये के कारण स्कूल नहीं जा पाती है।
- कई अध्ययनों के अनुसार भारत में 15-24 वर्ष आयु वर्ग की युवा लड़िकयों की बेरोजगारी दर 11.5 प्रतिशत है, जबिक समान आयु वर्ग के युवा पुरुषों के मामले में यह 9.8 प्रतिशत है।
- वर्ष 2018 में राष्ट्रीय बाल अधिकार संरक्षण आयोग द्वारा जारी रिपोर्ट में कहा गया था कि 15-18 वर्ष आयु वर्ग की लगभग 39.4 प्रतिशत लड़िकयां स्कूली शिक्षा हेतु किसी भी संस्थान में पंजीकृत नहीं है और इनमें से अधिकतर या तो घरेलू कार्यों में संलग्न होती है या भीख मांगने जैसे कार्यों में।
- आँकडे यह भी बताते हैं कि भारत में अभी भी लगभग

145 मिलियन महिलाएँ है जो पढ़ने या लिखने में असमर्थ हैं।

 उल्लेखनीय है कि भारत में ग्रामीण क्षेत्रों में शहरी क्षेत्रों की अपेक्षा स्थिति और गंभीर हैं।

भारत में महिला शिक्षा का इतिहास :

भारत में महिला शिक्षा की वर्तमान स्थिति को समझने के लिए आवश्यक है कि इतिहास में इसकी विकास यात्रा को भी समझा जाए। इसे मुख्यतः 3 भागों में स्पष्ट किया गया है

पाचीन वैदिक कालः

- भारत में महिला शिक्षा का इतिहास प्राचीन वैदिक काल से जुड़ा हुआ है।
- वैदिक अवधारणा के स्त्री शक्ति सिद्धांत के अनुसार महिलाओं की देवी के रूप में पूजा शुरू हुई — उदाहरण के लिए शिक्षा की देवी सरस्वती।
- वैदिक शास्त्र कहते है कि "लड़कों के साथ लड़िकयों को उचित देखभाल के साथ पोषित और प्रशिक्षित किया जाना चाहिए।
- वैदिक साहित्य में उन महिलाओं का भी उल्लेख किया गया
 है जिन्होंने वैदिक अध्ययन का रास्ता चुना।

बिटिश इंडिया:

- इस काल में पहला ऑल गर्ल्स बोर्डिंग स्कूल वर्ष 1821 में दक्षिण भारत के तिरूनेलवेली में स्थापित किया गया था।
- वर्ष 1840 तक स्कॉटिश चर्च सोसाइटी द्वारा दक्षिण भारत में निर्मित छह स्कूल मौजूद थे जिनमें कुल 200 लड़िक्यों का नामांकन कराया गया था।
- वर्ष 1948 में पुणे में गर्ल्स स्कूल की शुरूआत करने वाले ज्योतिबा फुले और उनकी पत्नी सावित्री बाई पश्चिम भारत में महिला शिक्षा के क्षेत्र में अग्रणी थे।
- पश्चिम भारत में महिला शिक्षा की शुरूआत पुणे में गर्ल्स स्कूल के निर्माण के साथ हुई जिसे वर्ष 1848 में ज्योतिबा फुले और उनकी पत्नी सावित्री बाई ने शुरू किया था।
- उल्लेखनीय है कि 1850 तक मद्रास मिशनिरयों ने स्कूल में लगभग 8,000 से अधिक लड़िकयों का नामांकन कराया था।
- ईस्ट इंडिया कंपनी के कार्यक्रम वुडस डिस्पैच ने वर्ष

1854 में महिलाओं की शिक्षा और उनके लिए रोजगार की आवश्यकता को स्वीकार किया।

- वर्ष 1879 में स्थापित बेथ्यून कॉलेज वर्तमान में एशिया का सबसे पुराना महिला कॉलेज हैं।
- गौरतलब है कि महिलाओं की समग्र साक्षरता दर वर्ष 1832 में 0.2 प्रतिशत से बढ़कर वर्ष 1947 में 6 प्रतिशत हो गई।

स्वतंत्र भारतः

- स्वतंत्रता के समय देश में महिला साक्षरता दर काफी कम थी, जिसे सरकार द्वारा नजरअंदाज नहीं किया जा सकता था। इस तथ्य को ध्यान में रखते हुए वर्ष 1958 में सरकार ने महिला शिक्षा पर एक राष्ट्रीय समिति का गठन किया, जिसकी सभी सिफारिशें स्वीकार कर ली गई।
- वर्ष 1959 में इसी विषय पर गठित एक समिति ने लड़कों और लड़िकयों के लिए एक समान पाठ्यक्रम को विभिन्न चरणों में लागू करने की सिफारिश की।
- वर्ष 1964 में स्थापित शिक्षा आयोग ने बड़े पैमाने पर महिला शिक्षा के विषय में बात की और वर्ष 1968 में भारत सरकार से एक राष्ट्रीय नीति विकसित करने की सिफारिश की।

महिला शिक्षा की आवष्यकताः

- महिलाओं को शिक्षित करना भारत में कई सामाजिक बुराइयों जैसें — दहेज प्रथा, कन्या भ्रूण हत्या और कार्यस्थल पर उत्पीडन आदि को दूर करने की कुंजी साबित हो सकती है।
- यह निश्चित तौर पर देश के आर्थिक विकास में भी सहायक होगा, क्योंकि अधिक से अधिक शिक्षित महिलाएँ देश के श्रम बल मे हिस्सा ले पाएंगी।
- हाल ही में स्वास्थ्य मंत्रालय द्वारा एक सर्वेक्षण जारी किया गया है, जिसमें बच्चों की पोषण स्थिति और उनकी माताओं की शिक्षा के बीच सींघा संबंध दिखाया गया है।
- इस सर्वेक्षण से यह बात सामने आई कि महिलाएँ जितनी अधिक शिक्षित होती है, उनके बच्चों को उतना ही अधिक पोषण आधार मिलता है।

महिला शिक्षा के मार्ग में बाधाएँ :

- भारतीय समाज पुरुष प्रधान है। महिलाओं को पुरुषों के बराबर सामाजिक दर्जा नहीं दिया जाता है और उन्हें घर की चारदीवारी तक सीमित कर दिया जाता है।
- लैंगिक असमानता की चुनौती आज भी हमारे समक्ष एक कठोर वास्तविकता के रूप में खड़ी है।

- समाज में यह मिथ्र काफी प्रचलित है कि किसी विशेष कार्य या परियोजना के लिए महिलाओं की दक्षता उनके पुरुष समकक्षों के मुकाबले कम होती है।
- देश में महिला सुरक्षा अभी एक बड़ा मुद्दा बना हुआ है.
 जिसके कारण कई अभिभावक लड़िकयों को स्कूल भेजने से कतराते हैं।

महिला शिक्षा हेतु सरकार के प्रयासः

- बेटी बचाओं, बेटी पढाओं की शुरूआत वर्ष 2015 में देश भर में घटते बाल लिंग अनुपात के मुद्दों को संबोधित करने हेतु की गयी थी। यह महिला और बाल विकास मंत्रालय स्वास्थ्य एवं परिवार कल्याण मंत्रालय तथा मानव संसाधन मंत्रालय की संयुक्त पहल है।
- कस्तूरबा गांधी बालिका विद्यालय योजना की शुरूआत वर्ष 2004 में विशेष रूप से कम साक्षरता दर वाले क्षेत्रों में लड़िक्यों के लिए प्राथमिक स्तर की शिक्षा की व्यवस्था करने हेतु की गई थी।
- महिला समाख्या कार्यक्रम की शुक्तआत वर्ष 1989 में राष्ट्रीय शिक्षा नीति 1986 के लक्ष्यों के अनुसार महिलाओं की शिक्षा में सुधार व उन्हें सशक्त करने हेतु की गई थी।
- यूनिसेफ भी देश में लड़िकयों को गुणवत्तापूर्ण शिक्षा प्रदान करने हेतु भारत सरकार के साथ काम रहा है।
- इसके अलावा महिला शिक्षा के उत्थान की दिशा में झारखण्ड ने भी एक बड़ी पहल की है। झारखंड स्कूल ऑफ एजूकेशन ने कक्षा 9 से 12 वीं तक की सभी छात्राओं को मुफ्त पाद्य पुस्तक, यूनिफॉर्म और नोटबुक बांटने का फैसला किया है।
- महिलाओं की शिक्षा समाज के विकास और प्रगति के लिए एक महत्वपूर्ण कदम है। यह न केवल महिलाओं के व्यक्तित्व का विकास करता है, बल्कि पूरे समाज को एक सकारात्मक दिशा में ले जाता है।
- महिलाओं की शिक्षा समाज में समानता और समरसता को बढ़ाती है। यह उन्हें स्वतंत्र और सामाजिक रूप से सक्रिय बनाता है, जिससे उसका आत्मविश्वास बढ़ता है।
- महिलाओं की शिक्षा का महत्व इसलिए भी है क्योंकि यह उन्हें अपने स्वार्थों को पहचानने और अपने लक्ष्यों को प्राप्त करने में मदद करता है। महिलाओं की शिक्षा समाज में विविधता और आर्थिक समृद्धि को बढ़ाने में मदद करती है।










Sana- What pivotal factor has brought you to this point?



Afroz: What advice would you give to aspiring BCA students who want to perform well academically?



Megha: Finally, what does receiving this gold medal mean to you personally and professionally?



Smriti: What role does discipline and dedication play in your training regimen?


Aanchal: By having these qualities, I am able to maximize my potential, overcome obstacles, and pursue excellence in my athletic endeavors.
